Ukwanshin's 5th Gakumun (Study) Tour left on May 30, with anticipation and excitement to the events ahead. Everyone was unaware of the experiences they would face on this "homecoming", that would touch their hearts, and affect their lives.

The tour began as usual with our paying respects at Shuri's Tamaudun Royal Tombs, and continued with days in North, South , and Central Okinawa. Unlike regular tours, there was no tour bus, as we drove ourselves to get to places that tourists cannot access, and to get the real connection to the real Okinawa.

personal stories helped to bring more understanding to our identity, culture and history.

One of the more emotional points was our visit to the exhibit of a tragic accident at Miyamori Elementary in Ishikawa, where a U.S. military plane crashed into Miyamori Elementary School in 1959, killing 17 students and teachers and injuring

over 200 at the school. We presented a donation at the current memorial at the school, to assist the building of a memorial hall for this tragic event in Okinawa's history.



It is here that we again heard "The Battle of Okinawa has not ended". Our visit did seem to impact the community and individuals. Kumiko Iha of the Four Sisters said, "Thanks to Hawaii's concern and interest in not only Okinawa's celebrations, but also the



suffering, we who have experienced things like this can finally come out and talk about what happened...our experiences, and healing can finally begin. We cannot forget our suffering so that these things never happen again. Okinawa wants peace, not only for ourself, but for the world."

The experiences on the tour showed the two sides of Okinawa. The real lives of the people that celebrate their culture, but who have also suffered much and continue to suffer with loss of identity, traditions and

the almost extinction of the native languages. With the Worldwide Uchinaanchu Taikai coming up in October, both Okinawa and its worldwide shimanchu need to reflect on the dilemmas facing modern day Okinawa and begin it's action to revitalization while celebrating identity.



Members of Ukwanshin will be participating as part of the performing arts event in the Uchinaanshu Taikai this October. Norman Kaneshiro, Keith Nakaganeku and Eric Wada have been asked to participate in the Ryukyu Performing Arts Show at the

National Theater in Naha. The show will feature foreign and local Okinawan music and dance artists in traditional performances on October 15th and 16th.

On Thursday, October 20th, Jamie Oshiro will join the trio in two Ukwanshin concerts at Tembusukan in Naha. The show will feature Hawaii's music and dances and how it connects to the revitalization of Okinawa's true culture, arts, history and language.

This visit was unexpected, especially after just coming back in

June. Requests were made for Ukwanshin to return for the Taikai, because of our projects to focus on identity loss and revitalization. A symposium is also being planned.
